<p>Provide lunchtime and after school clubs run by Star Sports. These clubs are free to parents and carers and meet the aim of engaging more pupils in regular physical activity.</p>	<p>In particular we wished to involve children in receipt of free school meals to these clubs to increase their access to regular physical exercise.</p> <p>More broadly we wished to offer all pupils more chances to engage in regular physical activity both before and after school and at lunchtime.</p>	<p>Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity.</p>	<p>Approximately 20 children attended each free morning or after school club with priority being given to children on free school meals. Lunchtime clubs always operated at maximum capacity – 20 children at any one time.</p> <p>The school has an ongoing relationship with the private company delivering these clubs. The clubs have been budgeted to continue in 2024/25.</p>	<p>£15179.02 + £2970.98 (form 2022/23) = £18150</p>

<p>Provide more opportunities for pupils to engage in competitive sport by assigning a member of staff to lead inter-school competitions.</p>	<p>All children in Key Stage 1 and 2 including those who have a talent for sport, but also for children with special needs to have access to competitions as well.</p>	<p>Increased participation in competitive sport.</p> <p>The profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement</p>	<p>The school entered 20 inter-school competitions and approximately 100 children had the chance to represent the school in a competition.</p> <p>The school finished 10th in the Thurrock school medal table.</p> <p>The school achieved 4 2nd place finishes in major competitions.</p> <p>The school has paid the subscription to allow it to enter competitions for the 2024-25 season.</p> <p>A member of staff will be assigned to lead competitive sport and will be given release time to do so.</p>	<p>£3573.90 contribution towards member of staff's salary leading the competitions.</p> <p>£750 School sports partnership entry fee for 2023-24.</p>
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<p>Provide more PE equipment so that pupils can engage in a wider range of sport.</p>	<p>All children from Early Years to Year 6.</p>	<p>Broader experience of a range of sports and physical activities offered to all Pupils</p>	<p>The school purchased additional PE equipment to allow all children from Years 1 to 6 to engage in 2 to 2.5 hours of quality PE each week.</p> <p>Although not funded through the PE premium, the school employs three coaches through an outside agency who will continue to deliver a broad and balanced PE curriculum using the new equipment ensuring that all children from Year 1 to 6 get access to 2 to 2.5 hours of quality PE a week.</p>	<p>£2807.25 spent on PE equipment and new PE equipment.</p>
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<p>Train current year 5 children to act as sports ambassadors in 2024/5</p>	<p>Provide leadership opportunities for Year 5 children and enable them to lead activities at lunchtime thereby benefitting all children in Year 5 and 6.</p>	<p>Engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity.</p>	<p>12 children were trained who will be able to lead activities. This will be made sustainable by being included in next year's PE and sport premium budget.</p>	<p>£200 funded from school budget as PE premium was overspent for 2023/24</p>
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Key achievements 2023-2024

Activity/Action	Impact	Comments
<p>Entered 20 inter-school competitions and finished 10th in the Thurrock medal table out of 20 schools.</p> <p>Notable successes included: The school finished 2nd in the swimming gala (by a very narrow margin) The school came 1st in the track events for group 3 at Borough Olympics and 2nd in field which meant that we came 2nd overall. The school also finished 2nd in the Dynamo cricket competition for Year 5 and 6.</p> <p>We also entered the boys' and girls' football league and cups and the boys' and girls' cricket league and cups. We also have a netball club that entered the Thurrock netball rally. The boys' cricket team finished 2nd in the league and got to the cup semi-finals.</p> <p>Children with special educational needs also got to represent the school in a competition and also participated in a bowling session.</p>	<p>Approximately 100 children got to represent the school in different competitive events.</p> <p>The role of sport across the school was raised and children and staff felt pride in the school achievements.</p> <p>The school has become a competitive force in the local authority once again.</p>

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	70%	<p>We are fortunate to be able to access the local pool by walking there and have a good relationship with them.</p> <p>The school finished 2nd in the swimming gala and there is no doubt that the proximity of the pool helps in the number of children who can swim.</p> <p>The school provided an £800 contribution from school funds to provide catch-up lessons for the 30% of Year 6 children who still could not swim in the summer term 2024.</p>
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	70%
